### ARTICULATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN

### FAIRLEIGH DICKINSON UNIVERSITY AND

#### COUNTY COLLEGE OF MORRIS

On this day of September, 2019 Fairleigh Dickinson University ("FDU") and County College of Morris ("CCM") enter into this Articulation Agreement ("Agreement") hereby agree to establish a program that enables certain qualified students from College to attend FDU in certain undergraduate degree programs and specific graduate programs (hereafter defined as the "Program").

FOR AND IN consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

#### **Transfer Terms:**

#### B.A. in Individualized Studies in Hospitality Management

The parties agree that those individuals, who receive a County College of Morris A.A.S. degree in Culinary Arts and Science, Hospitality Management, or Hospitality Management, Restaurant and Culinary Management and meet all of the criteria listed below, will be accepted at Fairleigh Dickinson University into the Bachelor of Arts in Individualized Studies with a specialization in Hospitality Management.

Fairleigh Dickinson University, through its B.A. in Individualized Studies with a specialization in Hospitality Management program currently offered in the Petrocelli College of Continuing Studies, International School of Hospitality and Tourism Management agrees to:

- accept 60 transfer credits as part of the A.A.S. in Culinary Arts & Sciences, Hospitality Management, or Hospitality Management, Restaurant and Culinary Management from County College of Morris to meet the course requirements in the B.A. in Individualized Studies with a specialization in Hospitality Management program as outlined in Appendix A,B,C, with a grade of "C" or better. (Appendixes will be revised periodically, or as necessary to reflect curriculum changes.)
- enroll students into the B.A. in Individualized Studies with a specialization in Hospitality Management program using the curriculum requirements that are in effect at the time of their entry into Fairleigh Dickinson University.

#### B.S. in Hotel & Restaurant Management

The parties agree that those individuals who receive a County College of Morris A.A.S. degree in Hospitality Management and meet all of the criteria listed below, will be accepted at Fairleigh Dickinson University into the Bachelor Science in Hotel and Restaurant Management.

Fairleigh Dickinson University, through its B.S. in program in Hotel & Restaurant Management currently offered in the Petrocelli College of Continuing Studies, International School of Hospitality and Tourism Management agrees to:

- accept 60 transfer credits as part of the A.A.S. in Hospitality Management from County College of Morris to meet the course requirements in the B.S. as outlined in Appendix D, check sheet, with a grade of "C" or better. (Appendix D will be revised periodically, or as necessary to reflect curriculum changes.)
- enroll students into the B.S. in Hotel & Restaurant Management program using the curriculum requirements that are in effect at the time of their entry into Fairleigh Dickinson University.

#### Criteria:

#### B.A. in Individualized Studies in Hospitality Management

Admissions standards for students entering into the Program from CCM will be consistent with FDU policies.

The additional criteria that shall be met by students seeking to transfer credits from the A.A.S. in Culinary Arts and Sciences, Hospitality Management, or Hospitality Management, Restaurant and Culinary Management at County College of Morris to the Bachelor of Arts in Individualized Studies with a specialization in Hospitality Management program is as follows:

- The student will have received a A.A.S. in either Culinary Arts and Sciences, Hospitality Management, or Hospitality Management, Restaurant and Culinary Management from County College of Morris.
- The student's cumulative grade point ratio at County College of Morris must be 2.0 or higher.
- A grade of "C", or better, is required in all courses to be applied toward the bachelor's degree.
- Students will adhere to Fairleigh Dickinson University's B.A. in Individualized Studies with a specialization in Hospitality Management curriculum requirements that are in effect at the time of their entry into Fairleigh Dickinson University.
- Students must submit a formal application to Fairleigh Dickinson University.
- Students will be required to meet all of the Fairleigh Dickinson University transfer requirements in effect at the time of their application to the University.

**Notice**. Every notice required or permitted under this Agreement shall, unless otherwise specifically provided herein, be given in writing and may be sent by either United States Postal Service Certified Mail, return receipt requested, or by reputable overnight courier, provided that such courier obtains and makes available to its customers evidence of delivery. All notices shall addressed by the party giving, making or sending the same to the at the address set forth below or to such other address as either party may designate from time to time by a notice given to the other party.

Notice shall be deemed to be given upon receipt, provided, however, that in the event a party shall refuse to accept delivery, the notice shall nevertheless be deemed to be given upon the date of refusal to accept delivery. Notwithstanding the above, a notice of change of address shall not be effective until received.

Non Discrimination. The parties to this Agreement hereby agree that they shall not unlawfully discriminate on the basis of race, color, creed, national origin, ancestry, disability, marital status, gender, sexual orientation, handicap, age, pregnancy status or veteran status in connection with this Agreement and that each shall fully comply with all Federal and State statutes, and all rules and regulations promulgated thereunder, concerning discrimination in connection with their respective obligations pursuant to this Agreement.

FERPA. College acknowledges that it may obtain contact information for FDU student(s) and/or FDU faculty. College shall only use the obtained contact information to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement and agrees not to release any information in the student or faculty profile to any third party. To the extent College is in possession of any student record or information, College shall treat same in accordance with all applicable federal, state and local laws, including, but not limited to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act.

**Miscellaneous**. The Director of FDU's International School of Hospitality and Tourism Management, shall serve as the main contact for the Program for FDU. Mark Cosgrove shall serve as the main contact for the Program at CCM.

This Agreement shall be governed and controlled by the laws of the State of New Jersey and any litigation with respect thereto shall be brought in the courts of the State of New Jersey. Both parties consents and submits to the jurisdiction of the courts located within the State of New Jersey. If any provision of this Agreement is declared invalid under any applicable law, such provision shall be inapplicable and deemed omitted, but the remaining provisions of this Agreement, including the remaining default remedies, shall be given effect in accordance with the manifest intent of the parties hereto.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, prior to instituting any lawsuit, the parties shall seek to resolve any dispute by negotiation and correspondence between the main contacts listed above.

#### **General Provisions:**

- a. Neither Party shall have the right to assign this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other Party.
- b. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties with respect to the subject to matter hereof. No modification hereof shall be binding upon any of the Parties hereto unless made in writing and signed by the Parties.
- c. The Parties are not, and shall not be, considered as partners or joint ventures. The execution of this Agreement does not, and shall not, constitute neither a partnership nor a principal/agent relationship between the Parties hereto.

Written Communication: Six credits in English composition (ENGL1111 Literature and Composition I and ENGL1112 Literature and Composition II).

Speech/Professional Communication: Three credits in a course substantially concerned with public speaking, oral, written and/or professional communication/presentations (e.g. SPCH1155 Public Speaking, COMM2101 Professional Communication).

Ethical and Moral Analysis: Three credits in a course from any discipline that is substantially concerned with ethical theories and questions such as a course in philosophy, religion or a course with "ethics" in its title (e.g. PHIL2255 Business Ethics, PHIL2261 Ethical Issues in Computer Information Technology, PHIL2351 Medical Law and Ethics).

Quantitative Analysis: Three of the six credits must be in a college-level mathematics course (e.g. MATH1131 College Mathematics I). The other three credits can be from a second mathematics course or from a statistics, logic, computer science, computer technology or other course that requires substantial quantitative analysis (e.g. MATH1132 College Mathematics II, MATH1142 Introduction to Statistics, PHIL1101 Introduction to Logic, MIS2151 Electronic Commerce and Beyond).

University Core: Eight credits of University Core courses are required; however, UNIV1001 Transitioning to College Life and UNIV1002 Preparing for Professional Life are waived for adult learners. International Perspective: Three credits in a course from any discipline that has an international, multinational or global perspective on its topic(s).

A minimum of nine credits must be taken in FDU graded course work and be at the 2000 level or above. Certain restrictions may apply.

Free Electives: It is recommended that interdisciplinary electives be chosen to support the area of specialization.

Credit for Experiential Learning: Credit for college level learning that has taken place outside of the traditional college classroom may be available through FDU's Experiential Learning Assessment Program that includes standardized exams (e.g. CLEP), challenge exams and/or ACE-approved credit recommendations.

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#### Additional Information

Written Communication: Six credits in English composition (ENGL1111 Literature and Composition I and ENGL1112 Literature and Composition II).

Speech/Professional Communication: Three credits in a course substantially concerned with public speaking, oral, written and/or professional communication/presentations (e.g. SPCH1155 Public Speaking, COMM2101 Professional Communication).

Ethical and Moral Analysis: Three credits in a course from any discipline that is substantially concerned with ethical theories and questions such as a course in philosophy, religion or a course with "ethics" in its title (e.g. PHIL2255 Business Ethics, PHIL2261 Ethical Issues in Computer Information Technology, PHIL2351 Medical Law and Ethics).

Quantitative Analysis: Three of the six credits must be in a college-level mathematics course (e.g. MATH1131 College Mathematics I). The other three credits can be from a second mathematics course or from a statistics, logic, computer science, computer technology or other course that requires substantial quantitative analysis (e.g. MATH1132 College Mathematics II, MATH1142 Introduction to Statistics, PHIL1101 Introduction to Logic, MIS2151 Electronic Commerce and Beyond).

Scientific Analysis: Six credits in course work from biology, chemistry, physics, environmental/earth/planetary sciences and/or other course that requires substantial scientific analysis (e.g. SCIE2008 Chemistry in Everyday Life, SCIE2010 Contemporary Environmental Issues). Courses need not be from the same scientific discipline.

Arts and Culture: Six credits from any combination of studio, performing or creative arts or global studies/culture including, but not limited to, computer animation, photography, creative writing, dance, film production, globalization, culture and identity, world literature. Courses may be from the same discipline/category (e.g. ART1071 Film and Society, ENGL2211 Masterpieces of Literature I, ENGL3111 Introduction to Memoir Writing, SOCI3610 Multicultural Perspectives).

Social and Behavioral Sciences: Six credits from any combination of courses in the social sciences (anthropology, economics, criminology, geography, political science, sociology) or behavioral sciences (psychology or communication studies). Courses may be in the same discipline; at least three credits must be at the 2000 level or above.

Humanities: Six credits in any combination of courses in history, literature, philosophy, art history, film (not filmmaking). Courses may be in the same discipline; at least three credits must be at the 2000 level or above.

University Core: Eight credits of University Core courses are required; however, UNIV1001 Transitioning to College Life and UNIV1002 Preparing for Professional Life are waived for adult learners. If waived, these two credits can be replaced by transfer credits or an additional two free elective credits.

International Perspective: Three credits in a course from any discipline that has an international, multinational or global perspective on its topic(s).

Advanced Writing: Three credits in a writing-intensive course at the 2000 level or above (e.g. ENGL3111 Introduction to Memoir Writing, ENGL3115 Food Writing, ENGL3141 Travel Writing).

**Specialization:** A minimum of 18 credits that provides the student an opportunity to pursue a single area of study in depth. Alternatively, an adviser may approve a combination of courses that makes up an individualized, cohesive unit of study. A minimum of nine credits must be taken in FDU graded course work and be at the 2000 level or above. Certain restrictions may apply.

Free Electives: It is recommended that interdisciplinary electives be chosen to support the area of specialization.

Credit for Experiential Learning: Credit for college level learning that has taken place outside of the traditional college classroom may be available through FDU's Experiential Learning Assessment Program that includes standardized exams (e.g. CLEP), challenge exams and/or ACE-approved credit recommendations.
